NSS Camp Report (30/12/22 to 5/1/23) 2022-23

#### **Summary of the Camp:**

Students were divided into seven groups and were assigned various duties such as Kitchen Work, Camp Cleaning and Maintenance, Outdoor activity related to Social Service and cultural activities in such a way that each group will get chance to perform in all mentioned areas during 7 days Camp.





Day 2: Date: 31/12/2022

I

On 31 December 2023, Head of the Department of Economics, Prof. Dr. N. N. Dr. Gadhe guided the volunteers in the camp about 'Pradhan Mantri Jan Dhan Yojana'.

Objective of "Pradhan Mantri Jan-Dhan Yojana (PMJDY)" is ensuring access to various financial services like availability of basic savings bank account, access to need based credit, remittances facility, insurance and pension to the excluded sections i.e. weaker sections & low income groups. Further he explained the eligibility criteria for this scheme. The person should normally be head of the family or an earning member of the family and should be in the age group of 18 to 59 (i.e. person should be at least 18 years old, and should not have turned 60).

Dr. Gadhe said that the dividends of the several government schemes now can directly deposited in beneficiary's accounts, which is very crucial in minimizing the corruption.

II

Dr. Vidya Surve guided the volunteers on the topic "Importance of Indigenous Tribal Folklore" On this occasion she expressed the opinion that tribal folk culture must be preserved for us and our coming generations. Oral traditions are verbal narratives that could consist of spiritual messages, mythology, and folklore. Further she explained that there can be an abundance of language but the unavailability of mutually intelligible scripts, folklore is transferred to the next generation through stories and legends. It can also be in the form of songs and conveyed ceremonially at appropriate settings. In the original telling of the stories, elders highlighted the symbiotic relationships between humans and the rest of the natural world. Folklore could include poetry, riddles, songs, music, dances, and also traditional wisdom based on plant varieties grown by farmers, and plant extracts developed by local medicine men.

III

Dr. Rupali Deore guided the volunteers on the topic "Digital Literacy."

"Digital literacy refers to someone's ability to use IT and digital technology to find, evaluate, create and communicate information," Said Dr. Rupali Deore. Digital literacy would enable a


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person to create range of different digital documents and to use digital communication systems. Digital literacy involves four major pillars as the abilities to:

- Stay up to date with existing technologies
- Properly communicate in an online environment
- Manage your ideas in an online environment
- Manage teams leveraging technology

Within these abilities are *many* technologies you could learn, including some that most employers will expect you to know. For example, communicating in an online environment could involve video conferencing platforms that a manager might expect to train you in, but it also involves using email, a skill employers will likely expect you to have when you walk in the door.

Digital Literacy is the need of the hour and in that regard she urged the students to make efforts to increase this literacy.

Day 3: Date: 01/01/2023

Ι

On January 01, 2023, the Head of the Department of Mathematics Prof. Dr. VR Nikam guided the volunteers in the camp about the 'New Educational Policy'.

A New Education Policy has been sanctioned by our government in July 2020; after a gap of 34 years, for bringing the changes in the National Education System. The New Education Policy has its objective of making the learning process more efficient by enhancing students thinking and creative ability. The New Education Policy includes several changes in the school level as well as higher education. He further explained the necessity and objective of NEP and concluded that the present education system is the result of changes made in the existing education policy of 1986. It has been implemented to foster the learner and the nation's development. The new education policy focuses on the child's overall development. The policy is destined to achieve its objective by 2030.

He further added that the vision of the National Education Policy 2020 is to build the foundations of a new India that will focus on building a knowledge society. Every aspect of the NEP has a symbiotic relationship to the cause of institution building for nation building. However, the rhetoric of the policy vision outlined in the NEP must be implemented for this vision to become a reality. Multi-stakeholder participation and active involvement is a sine qua non for the implementation of public policy in every aspect of governance, especially in education.

II

Vice Principal Prof. Dr. K.H. Kapadnis guided the students on the topic of "New Educational Policy and Reality" During this lecture he explained the pros and cons of New Education Policy. While explaining the impact of NEP he said that in the new educational policy, students have the freedom to choose subjects of their choice in an interdisciplinary manner in accordance with the choice base credit, which will create a complete and well-rounded student.

He further added that every effort in policy making requires significant impetus in capacity building. The new institutional design for effective implementation of the NEP will ensure that we

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create a robust institutional architecture that will leave no stone unturned in the process of NEP implementation. The inspiring vision of the NEP 2020 can be effectively implemented only if we are ready to establish institutional mechanisms outlined above to build the necessary capacity. The higher education ecosystem, especially the government agencies and regulatory bodies should commit themselves to build trust, promote transparent decision-making; recognize institutional autonomy; ensure active and participative consultation; and empower HEIs. This will form the bedrock based on which the time bound implementation of the NEP will become effective and impactful.

Day 4: Date: 02/01/2023

I

On 02 January 2023, Prof. Dr. S. B. Shisode guided NSS volunteers on 'Democracy and Voter Awareness' Right to vote is very valuable in a democracy. Democracy will be strengthened if every voter exercises the right to vote impartially and without pressure. While electing the people's representative, the voter must exercise the right to vote with a sense of responsibility. In India, many voters do not vote, so the volunteers of the National Service Scheme should take the initiative to create awareness among the electorate. The power to vote for your country is an important part of a democratic country like India. While many in our country are eligible to cast vote, few are enthusiastic about it. In the 2019 Lok Sabha elections, the voter turnout was 67.11% which is the highest turnout in the history of India. With every election, there has been a positive increase in voter turnout. Such an increase in voting is a positive welcome, as each and every vote counts for a better future of our country.

II

Dr. Kannor from Pschycology department conducted lecture on the topic, "Gender Equality and Awareness." He expressed that discrimination against women is unjust. It is necessary to work through the National Service Scheme to create a mentality in the society to treat women as equal to men. Gender equality basically means equality for men and women, politically, economically, in every aspect of life in health, education etc. While the laws of independent India are strong for giving security disposables to women, it is unfortunate that gender equality is still an issue. Humans are a different and better class than other animals and consider themselves superior to animals, however discrimination between humans is also often seen. Women have not been treated equally in society, their gender inequality has been going on for centuries. He further expressed the opinion that it is necessary to create public awareness to change the mindset of the science industry in the male dominated society. On this occasion, he conducted a psychological test of the students.

#### III

Dr. Santosh Tambe guided the students on the topic of "Biodiversity and Conservation". Biodiversity is essential for maintaining the ecological system of our planet. Rich biodiversity is a sign of a healthy environment. Conservation of biodiversity is vital for the survival of human beings as well as other living beings on Earth. A lot of emphasis is being given on the conservation of biodiversity these days. This is because rich biodiversity is what makes our planet fit for living.

The requirement to maintain biodiversity has often been overlooked. This is because we think that we are doing well for ourselves, even though many species have gone extinct until now and that we would remain unaffected even if few more go extinct. However, this is a misconception. Richness of biodiversity is essential for the proper functioning of our environment. We would not be able to survive in the times to come if the biodiversity continues to decline.

Dr. Tambe concluded with the thought that humans must keep a check on their activities and stop exploiting flora and fauna for serving their own selfish purposes. They must instead contribute towards the conservation of biodiversity.

Day 5: Date: 03/01/2023

I

On January 03, 2023, on the occasion of Savitribai Phule Jayanti, a lecture was given by Dr. Agnes Kharat on the topic "Savitribai Phule's contribution to women's education".

She said "Savitribai Phule was the first women, who stand alone for the girl's education, took lots of efforts to make women educated and make available first girl's school in Pune and in the memory of such Honorable women this day is celebrated. Savitribai Phule was a a great social reformer. She, with her breath taking personality and character, has brought about many changes and reforms in the society. She is known all over the country for her bravery. She is also regarded as the first female teacher of india. She is regarded as the mother of Indian feminism.

Savitribai Phule was a strong advocate for women's rights and actively worked to challenge the social norms that discriminated against women. She supported the rights of widows, who were often treated unfairly and advocated for the rights of women to inherit the property. Further Dr. Agnes Kharat applead all the students follow the footprints of this great educationalist and social reformer.

II

Prof. Kishor Rajguru guided the volunteer students on "River Cleanliness and Tree Plantation". While explaining the tree plantation he said trees give off oxygen that we need to breathe. Trees reduce the amount of storm water runoff, which reduces erosion and pollution in our waterways and may reduce the effects of flooding. Many species of wildlife depend on trees for habitat. Trees provide food, protection, and homes for many birds and mammals. He further added that by protecting and restoring our rivers, we play a critical role in bending the biodiversity curve. Rivers and the waters and nutrients they carry feed forests, wetlands and other terrestrial habitats, and are home to many species. River water is polluting due to plastic waste in rivers, growth of poisonous plants and bones of dead people etc. Therefore, he expressed the opinion that activities like river cleaning and tree plantation should be continuously implemented through the National Service Scheme.

III

Prof. RS Waghchaure guided the volunteer students on the topic of "Food Security Awareness". Food security is the need of the hour. Four elements build the framework of food and nutrition security: availability, access, use and utilization, and stability. He explained that poor people do not get enough nutritious food to eat, on the other hand, food is wasted during marriage ceremonies. It is a crime to waste food in this way. Strict legislation is required to be considered. He expressed the opinion that it is necessary to plan protective measures in order to feed the hungry. Youth plays an important role in the multifaceted challenges that global food systems face. Youth organizing practices such as non-formal education and cross-sectoral collaboration greatly enhance in students the sense of global citizenship, a feeling of belonging to a broader community and to act in ways that increase awareness of food security and sustainability in society.

Day 6: Date: 04/01/2023

Dr.Rakesh Patil guided the volunteers on "Environment Biodiversity Protection" in Special Winter Labor Camp at Nashik on 04 January 2023. Biodiversity is a human resource which protects our life. Mass extinctions due to rapid environmental changes is various serious issue. Since the creation of life on Earth, there have been five large-scale and many smaller-scale extinctions of biodiversity. Biodiversity helps sustain ecosystems. Thus, the balance of the environment is maintained. Maintaining biodiversity is very important. Genetic diversity persists despite changes in the environment. At any given moment or location, genes in a particular organism help that organism adapt to a changed environment. He expressed the view that it is necessary to reduce the loss of biodiversity. Maintaining air quality, purifying water, increasing pollination, preventing erosion, fertilizing soil, regulating chemicals in the atmosphere and water environment, etc. are achieved through biodiversity. Biodiversity is decreasing due to human activities like population growth, deforestation, pollution, global climate change etc. Biodiversity can be maintained by eliminating alien species from the ecosystem, reducing the use of pesticides, enacting laws at the national level to maintain biodiversity, creating gene pools, etc.

II

Prof. Sudam Bhadane guided the volunteer students on the topic of "Protecting Tribes in India". In the tribal society, trees are considered to be the abode of gods and goddesses. Their religious beliefs encourage natural protection of plants.

He said in In India, most of the tribes are collectively identified under Article 342 as "Scheduled Tribes". Since independence, the share of tribal population in the country has continuously been increasing census by census. In the current time, the tribal population of India is approaching around 9% of the total population of the country. The majority of these indigenous communities live in extreme poverty. They suffer from malnutrition and lack access to basic education and health facilities. He further explained that Unrestrained development in forest areas has led to the degradation of the forest areas which account for the major basis for the survival of the tribal community. India's ethnic people have played a vital role in preserving the biodiversity of several virgin forests and have conserved flora and fauna in sacred groves of tribals. He expressed the opinion that the tribal community has an important contribution. Although the tribal community has been protected through various laws, even today the tribal

community is exploited to some extent, he appealed to the volunteers to work to create awareness in the tribal community.
